AMBASSADOR YOUNG CALLS FOR 21ST CENTURY GLOBAL MARSHALL PLAN

Former U.N. Ambassador, Andrew Young, spoke in Leesburg on December 5th in the church where General Marshall had been a member and his 5-star flag still hangs.

His admiration for General Marshall began at age 15, growing up in Louisiana, where he said he wasn't a "very serious student." His grandmother gave him an assignment to do research on the Marshall Plan that ultimately formed one of the bases for his present day concept of a 'Global Marshall Plan' and 'Public Purpose Capitalism'—private investment for the public good.

Young's career also included service as a Congressman, Mayor of Atlanta, a key figure with Martin Luther King, Jr. during the civil rights movement; and White House staff during the Carter Administration. Besides 45 honorary degrees he has received the Presidential Medal of Freedom, France's Legion d'honneur, the NAACP's Springarn Medal and the Eagle Award. He now heads up Good Works International, an organization that engages in development projects in Africa and the Caribbean.

During his speech he referred to the 1936 Olympics in Berlin when Adolf Hitler refused to shake hands with Jesse Owens who had just won several track events. That helped to shape Ambassador Young's worldview. He said, "You don't get angry with sick people. You try to find a way to help them."

HUNDREDS HONOR AMERICAN VIETNAM VETERANS AT DODONA

A sunny day enhanced the 6th Annual Veterans Day Commemoration ceremony, co-hosted by the George C. Marshall International Center, the town of Leesburg and Loudoun County, on the grounds of Dodona Manor November 11th. Active duty and retired servicemen and women as well as civilians spilled out from underneath the tent in the gardens where keynote speakers, Rear Admiral William Cross (retired) and Senator James Webb, spoke about their experiences during the Vietnam War.

Cross expressed his gratitude for Americans treating recently returned Veterans with respect rather than with the harassment he experienced when he returned from Vietnam.

Webb agreed that Vietnam veterans in general did not receive the welcome home they deserved. He emphasized the importance of veterans continuing to take care of each other particularly through the G.I. Bill for college tuition and jobs which veterans from World Wars I, II, and the Vietnam War secured. "There's no greater honor in America than to be able to say that when my country needed me, I stepped forward and met the call," Webb said.

Her remarks emphasized General Marshall's dedicated military service, his integrity, and remarkable leadership during World War II and its aftermath. As a follow up, a contingent of officers from the Guard, in the Washington area for a conference, traveled to Leesburg on January 19th to visit Dodona. Thompson presented the introduction to the Marshall-Churchill Exhibition and provided a tour of the house. Dinner in the Marshall Room of the Lightfoot Restaurant followed. Thompson hopes that in the future other National Guard groups from around the country will develop a similar connection to the Center

NEW EDITION OF MARSHALL BIOGRAPHY IS COMING SOON

At press time, Special Projects Director, Rachel Thompson, announced that a new version of the Center's biography, *America's Hero to the World: George C. Marshall*, went to press in mid-February. The 4th edition short biography of Marshall, originally co-authored by Thompson and Lexington, Virginia writer, Mary Scott Skutt, for high school readers, is being extended and restyled to reach a more general audience. The material that focuses on the implementation of the Marshall Plan will be enriched to better accommodate European interest.

Thompson is the project director and writer of this version which carries the working title of "George C. Marshall: Soldier in War; Statesman in Peace"; Janet Van der Vaart is providing graphic and layout support. The volume is expected to be available in the Dodona bookstore later this spring. Thompson expressed her appreciation to retired naval commander Don Eager, who as a volunteer, researched the best local company to handle the reprint. Potomac Printing Solutions of Ashburn will provide 3000 copies of the volume.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

This past year was a good one for the Marshall Center with a great deal happening with respect to our programs and our historic house museum, Dodona Manor. It would be very hard to single out any one event as the most memorable of 2011.

On November 6th we hosted our first fundraising benefit styled An Evening with the Marshalls which was held in the Dodona Manor garden. Austria, a Marshall Plan country, was highlighted and we were honored to have Dr Christian Prosl, Austria's Ambassador to the United States, attend as the event's Honorary Chairman. (This year's fall benefit will honor Norway.)

Loudoun's annual Veteran's Day ceremony was held at Dodona Manor with more than 300 in attendance. Virginia Senator Jim Webb and Rear Admiral William Cross (Ret) were the speakers at an event which singled out Vietnam veterans for special recognition.

The Marshall-Churchill Exhibit opened in the Center's media room in May with a talk by our education specialist, Rachel Thompson, who authored much of its content. A reprise of Mrs. Thomson's talk on February 27th was co-sponsored for the first time with the Mosby Heritage Area Association.

Our Education Committee is busy planning this 2011's installment of the high school student exchange between public schools in Loudoun County and those in the German district of Main-Taunus-Kreis, as well as our Marshall Immersion Workshop for teachers. The student exchange has attracted a broad community and corporate support in the Frankfurt area, and Austria has expressed interest in our expanding it into their country.

To close out our year, we were honored to host former UN Ambassador Andrew Young

These and other factors in his life including the Marshall Plan and what he witnessed in Germany as total devastation in 1953 gave him the impetus for a nonviolent approach to conflict resolution.

Ambassador Young described an evening when he invited the Chinese delegation to the United Nations --in their Mao suits-- to his apartment for dinner. His whole family -- at his wife's insistence -- joined their guests at the table where they served 'Georgia' food. "We ended up sitting on the floor together, eating spare ribs and having an open, lively discussion."

In recent years Ambassador Young has been to Africa a number of times and illustrated the impact of the Marshall Plan model -- a 'Global Marshall Plan' as he discussed his vision of a transportation corridor in Algeria connecting with Nigeria and Ghana.

When asked about the polarization of the current Congress, the former Congressman said, "We had that when I was in Congress, but it was mitigated in three ways: the gym, the prayer breakfast and the cloak room where deals were made."

DEVOTED VOLUNTEER TENDS GENERAL MARSHALL'S VEGETABLE GARDEN

Ben Frank is a devoted gardener, and spends lots of time in General Marshall's vegetable garden at Dodona Manor during Leesburg's long growing season.

Born on a Wisconsin farm, he moved away with his family to the suburbs near the Twin Cities when he was only seven years old. "I never had the chance to get bored with gardening and I still have a pretty idealistic view about it," he explains. "I just love watching things grow."

"I started working at Dodona in 2005 or 2006. I know I came here as a garden volunteer after talking to Fred Morefield and Richard Rohrer, but not sure which of them gets the credit for recruiting me. Jackie Ellis was already overseeing the vegetable garden when I started working here."

Ben enjoys gardening so much he tends his own garden plot as well as the General's restored garden. His labors at Dodona provide produce to share with other volunteers and with Loudoun Interfaith. He estimates that a couple hundred pounds of produce is donated to the local charity each summer.

"As a Northerner, I've enjoyed learning how to grow sweet potatoes. Didn't have any experience with them previously. And, we're

still trying to get an asparagus bed going here," he explained.

"Pretty soon we'll be working on developing this year's seed orders; about this time last year we were reviewing the Burpee seed order," he added. General Marshall was a good customer of the Burpee Seed Company, enjoying a personal correspondence with the president of the company in the early 1950's. And the Burpee Company generously contributed to the vegetable garden restoration.

Though Ben enjoys his work at Dodona, he's more than willing to share the garden tasks with other volunteers. He encourages others with gardening interests to contact Dodona (703-777-1880) for information. "We can always use more willing hands in the garden," he adds.

QUEST FOR PARK SERVICE AFFILIATION CONTINUES

When the 111th Congress ended in December, Senate bill S.1750 and House bill HR.3757, both supporting the Marshall Center's quest to achieve status as a National Park Service Affiliate, died for lack of congressional action. Despite the need to begin anew with the 112th Congress Center Board Member Carl Biersack remains optimistic about the possibility of success for this effort.

"We're looking forward to the same bipartisan and bicameral support as represented by our sponsors Senator Webb and Representative

Wolf," Carl said. "They and their staffs, worked hard to get the bill enacted into law. Senator Webb made a valiant effort behind the scenes during the Lame Duck session to push the Senate bill through since it had already been reported out of the Senate's Energy & Natural Resources Committee with full support from the Department of Interior and the National Park Service."

Carl also cites Trevor Dean, Legislative Assistant to Senator Webb, and Daniel

BRINGING HISTORY TO LIFE

It's not often that Dodona Docents have a chance to learn about the impact their presentation to visitors may have had. But Docent Maggie Claridige had just that experience last spring when she received a special "Thank You" note from Liz Fulham.

Maggie met the Loudoun County student when she came to do research for her school History Fair project focusing on Madame Chiang Kai-shek. During her tour Maggie shared photos and stories about the famed friend of the Marshalls. Liz prepared and submitted her project entitled: "Who is Madame Chiang Kai-shek, and did her friendship with George and Katherine Marshall have any historical significance?"

The History Fair judges were impressed with Liz's project and awarded her first place in the local history category; Liz then competed at the county level. A few weeks later, Liz's note enthusiastically thanking Maggie for sharing so much information about the relationship between Mme Chiang Kai-shek and the Marshalls arrived at Dodona.

Most Docents agree that shedding light on Marshall's role in twentieth century US history is a highlight among their Dodona experiences.

IN MEMORIAM

Members of the Marshall Center Board of Directors and its friends were saddened to learn of the death of Nestor D. Sanchez on January 18th. Mr Sanchez served as Executive Vice President of the Center and, upon his retirement from the Board, was named a Director Emeritus. Mr. Sanchez had a distinguished 30-year career with the Central Intelligence Agency. He rose to chief of the Agency's Latin American division, before serving as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense in the Reagan administration. He was predeceased by his wife, Joan, however he is survived by four sons: John, Patrick, Tom and James. A native of New Mexico, Mr. Sanchez was educated at the New Mexico Military Institute and Georgetown University.

Friends of the Center can spend an evening with Lord Watson of Richmond CBE, M.A., the High Steward of the University of Cambridge, on Monday, May 9, as he shares his thoughts on the rise and relevance of the European Union including its links to the Marshall Plan.

Lord Watson's career spans broadcasting, politics and academia. For 27 years he was a BBC Television journalist hosting the BBC's flagship current affairs program and its premier business program. In politics, Lord Watson served as President of the Liberal Party during the merger which led to the formation of the present Liberal Democrats. He sits in the House of Lords and has served on key select committees on the European Union.

His awards include the Churchill Medal, the Commander's Grand Cross Romanian Order of Merit and the Knight's Grand Cross of the Order of Merit of the Federal Republic of Germany. He is currently Chairman of the Cambridge Foundation.

Scandling, Chief of Staff to Representative Wolf for their consistent support during the last Congress. He adds that Brent Robinson who works for Virginia Representative Rob Wittman, a member of the House Natural Resources Committee, has also been very helpful. "As we prepare for the re-introduction of the bills in the new Congress, we're working to get the entire Virginia delegation to support the effort as original cosponsors," he said.

"We are optimistic that our effort will receive

the same positive support from the Park Service that National Park Service Associate Director Stephen E. Whitesell expressed last year when testifying before the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources," commented Marshall Center Board President Steve Price. "We have known since this effort began that it could take some time to get a decision."

MY LOVE TO ALL OF YOU," MARSHALL FAMILY LETTERS,

Rachel Yarnell Thompson's presentation in the George C. Marshall Research Library on Thursday, February 17th offered a look into a collection of personal letters written by George C. Marshall to family members between 1942 and 1958. Providing valuable insights into the home life of a very private man, this set of original correspondence was given to the George C. Marshall International Center by Allen Tupper Brown Jr., the grandson of Katherine T. Marshall, and is now on loan to the Marshall Foundation.

Using images from the collection, plus rare family photographs, Mrs. Thompson's lecture includes poignant letters written by Marshall's stepson Allen Tupper Brown from the Italian front in March and April 1943. In one account he described a warm, sun-drenched day, but also foreshadowed his own future when he wrote: "The noise of the artillery is a reminder, however, and no matter how beautiful it is, it is bound to be a sad day for many people as is every day of this war."

Also featured in the presentation are Marshall's later letters to the widow of Allen Brown, Mrs. Margaret "Madge" Brown Pendleton. They reveal a man who with wit and charm maintained rich family connections, even as he confronted enormous international challenges. From Nanking, China, where he was brokering

a cease-fire between the warring forces of Mao and Chiang, he wrote her a generous thank you for an electric razor Christmas gift: "Everyone in the house," he noted, "is begging to give it a try. I introduced it at the dinner table, which is hardly a barbershop."

In another note, written from London in December 1947 while he was Secretary of State and attending the foreign ministers conference, he expressed to Madge that he would so much like to be visiting in her home rather than in "[these] interminable negotiations." Apologizing for the brevity of his message, he mentioned with a certain weariness, "I am due at 10 Downing Street in about 15 minutes and from there on to negotiations and from there to Buckingham Palace and then I hope to bed."

Although most of these letters were written against the backdrop of Marshall's public roles, those penned toward the end provide a glimpse of a man whose duties to country had finally been fulfilled.
