In April, the Marshall Center Board of Directors presented the second annual **Marshall Award in Ethical Leadership** to Dr. Robert Gates, the 22nd U.S. Secretary of Defense and a recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

In his acceptance speech, which is available on the Marshall Center's YouTube channel, Dr. Gates made a powerful case for the importance of ethical leadership at all levels of society: "Standing still cannot be an option. If our nation is to tackle the challenges of this century, from national security to the economy to the changing climate, ethical leadership, energy and good old-fashioned grit are indispensable keys to a better tomorrow."

Dr. Gates' call to action invokes the spirit of General Marshall, whose selfless service knew no bounds. Even when he was ready to retire to his garden at Dodona, Marshall answered the call time and again, and so must we. To build on the tremendous progress of recent years, Dr. Gates' words serve as an inspiring call to action.

LEESBURG NOMINATED

for World War II Heritage City Designation

In recognition of Leesburg's contributions to the World War Il effort, including its historic ties to General George C. Marshall, Leesburg Mayor Kelly Burk has presented to the National Park Service (NPS) a proposal to designate the Town of Leesburg as an American World War II Heritage City. The NPS program, which was established in 2019, empowers the Secretary of Interior to honor only one city or region from each state for its contributions to the World War Il effort and its continuing work to preserve its military history.

In her letter to NPS Director
Charles F. Sams III, Mayor Burk wrote
that "Our contribution to World
War II is highlighted by our ties to
General George C. Marshall who
lived in historic downtown Leesburg
at Dodona Manor during the War."
Burk noted that Marshall inspired
generations of Leesburg residents
while organizing the Allied victory as
Army Chief of Staff and through his
historic role as architect of the European
Recovery Program that changed the face
of the world.

In a letter of support, U.S.
Representative Jennifer Wexton (VA-10) wrote that "Dodona Manor serves as a time capsule, allowing visitors the opportunity to immerse themselves in a pivotal moment in our country's history." Wexton added that the Marshall Center's ethical leadership programs help ensure that "the lessons and values of this remarkable time in history are carried on through the next generation of young leaders."

Following a three-month review period, NPS Director Sams will forward nominations and recommendations for consideration and designation by the Secretary of the Interior. *

n June 2017, the Marshall Center hosted a highly successful 70th anniversary symposium suggested a **Book Club** to give members a on the Marshall Harvard speech. From this experience, both the Marshall Center Book Club and Foreign Policy Forum were born. More than six years later, both series continue to deliver.

The Foreign Policy Forum started as an in-person, "brown bag lunch" discussion group with a special focus on the State Department, which was once led by Secretary Marshall. Over Eisenbraun to help out. As a previous, welltime, host Les Janka started inviting experts to offer talks on current topics. Inviting key people from the D.C. policy, think tank and academic communities had the additional benefit of promoting the Marshall Center profile across the Capital Region.

As those meetings grew, some participants chance to learn even more about key topics and come together to discuss them. These too started as lunch events. While the COVID-19 attendance numbers have grown on Zoom and offered the benefit of extending the events' reach across the country and beyond.

aunched in 2021 as a small, invitation-only networking event on the Stone Patio at Dodona Manor, **Off Duty** has since become a signature Marshall Center offering. Volunteer PROFILE

What attracted you to becoming a volunteer at Dodona?

After I retired from the Army, I moved to Leesburg and joined VFW Post 1177 of Loudoun County. The Post was invited to support the Spring CleanUp at Dodona with the Loudoun County High School JROTC unit a few years ago. Cleaning out the garage, I was fascinated by the garden tool sharpener installed between the two large doors, and one of the volunteers told me that it was original – "had been there forever." I suddenly realized that I was cleaning the workbench where one of the most famous military leaders in the history of our country had worked, and I was hooked.

I have a soft spot for antique cars and Jeeps as well. I've always been kind of a gearhead, and during my first military duty tour back in the 70's in San Diego, I would find and restore old British sports cars for resale. I'd find one sitting in a garage or in the corner of someone's yard, make a great deal (typically they weren't running), drag it home and start cleaning it up and making it run. Then I'd sell it, pocket the cash and go find another.

Fast forward 50 years, and I currently maintain the '53 Willys Army Jeep owned by the local VFW Post and have a '92 Jeep Wrangler that I use during the summer. So, when [Executive Director Valérie Beaudoin] said she needed help with General Marshall's Wagon, it seemed only logical to help out with a 3rd Willys vehicle. *

"Two Gifts"

The Story of Marshall's Willys Wagon

Aunique gem preserved as a living reminder of General Marshall's inspiring legacy, Dodona Manor provides visitors an opportunity to revisit a moment in time when American leadership saved democracy and preserved peace during troubled times.

One of the most iconic treasures of General Marshall's life and time at Dodona is our faithful replica of his green Willys Jeep Station Wagon. The wagon is a special part of Marshall history, as it speaks to both his professional legacy and modest personality. Marshall, who was instrumental in greenlighting the production of the jeep for military use in World War II, called the jeep "America's greatest

contribution to modern warfare."

The backstory of this artifact is a heartening tale of two gifts, starting with the original Jeep, which Marshall – ever averse to fanfare – accepted reluctantly in 1948 from

the Willys Overland Co. Our historically accurate replica was itself a gift, this time from Jaap de Groot, a Dutch Marshall admirer and leading collector of WWII military vehicles. In 2005, De Groot enlisted the assistance of his Wisconsinite son-in-law and fellow

collector Kevin Kronlund, who helped identify the correct make and model. An impressive trans-Atlantic family affair!

Channeling General Marshall's spirit of selfless service, supporters and donors continue to step up to the challenging task of restoring and maintaining this unique piece of American

history for current and future generations. We are particularly grateful to 24-year military veteran and Bronze Star recipient Dennis Boykin, [profiled on PAGE 6] who has generously donated his extraordinary expertise, time and


