Emerging Leaders Program Kicks Off

n mid-July, a group of emerging leaders from a Northern Virginiabased trade association traveled to Dodona Manor to experience the first edition of **Character at** Work: The George C. Marshall **Professional Leadership Seminar.**

Building on the foundation of Five-Star Character, the Marshall Center's successful ethical leadership conference for high school students,



Character at Work got off to a strong start. Leveraging lessons from the life and career of General Marshall, the seminar took the group of 14 professionals on a day-long, hands-on experience grappling with and applying the three pillars of Marshall-style

ethical leadership: Selfless Service, **Unwavering Integrity and** Visionary Leadership.

The day started with a tour of the house and a historical introduction by top Marshall Center docents. The group transitioned to a seminar

shared promise statements that outlined how they intended to use the lessons of the day in their work over the weeks and months ahead. The afternoon also featured treats from our nearby favorite shop, Mom's Apple Pie.

A few of our favorite comments from the evaluations included, "I was honestly expecting this to be super dry... it was not," and "It was more relevant to

our daily operations and not just a generic leadership course." And we of course agree with one suggestion to improve the course: "More pie."

o prepare for growth and longterm sustainability of Dodona Manor, the Marshall Center is moving forward on plans to build a new museum addition on the grounds of the Marshalls' home in Leesburg. The plan is to break ground in late 2023 and open the new facility in 2024.

The building will give the Marshall Center a home for its growing ethical leadership training programs.

The Town of Leesburg has granted initial approval for the preliminary plan for the museum space, which will give a significant boost to the Marshall Center and its mission to "bring to life the timeless values of selfless service and unwavering integrity to develop visionary leaders worldwide."

The new facility, which is yet to be named, will deliver:

1) Educational Facilities: The building will give the Marshall Center a home for its growing ethical



leadership training programs, which are sharing the history and legacy of Marshall with the leaders of today and tomorrow.

2) Expanded Exhibit Space: The building will provide tech-friendly exhibit space, allowing the Marshall

Center to tell a more complete story of the life and legacy of George C. Marshall.

3) Improved Visitor Support: The building will efficiently host visitors

and student groups - especially those with limited mobility and other physical challenges - as they learn about Marshall and how he can inspire leaders today.

4) Adequate Workspace: The building will provide invaluable workspace for the staff, curatorial experts and docent volunteers who tell Marshall's story.

The new facility will reduce unnecessary wear and tear on Dodona Manor; leverage technology to boost our educational programs; and support increased learning, historical research and exhibit preparation.

"An essential part of any successful action on the part of the United States is an understanding on the part of the people of America of the character of the problem and the remedies to be applied. Political passion and prejudice should have no part."

With these words, spoken on June 5, 1947, at Harvard University, Secretary of State George C. Marshall made the case for massive American investment in the devastated economies of post-World War II Europe. This year, we have been celebrating the 75th anniversary of the Marshall plan and the visionary leader who played a pivotal role at a defining moment in world history.

As we commemorate this milestone, global geopolitical developments remind us that the timeless values Marshall embodied – selfless service, unwavering integrity and commitment to freedom and democracy – are needed now more than ever.



5 Years of the Marshall Plan

Recognizing the Moment that Sparked the Marshall Plan

On June 5, 200 guests participated in a special event at Dodona Manor celebrating the 75th anniversary of Marshall's momentous Harvard speech outlining the principles for European post-war recovery. The event featured remarks from Her Excellency, the British Ambassador to the U.S., Dame Karen Pierce and senior diplomats from the embassies of Sweden and Luxembourg.

Ambassador Pierce highlighted the continued geopolitical relevance of the plan's underpinnings, noting that Marshall "fundamentally understood the importance of a Europe that would be peaceful, that would be self-sustaining and that would be a friend of the United States."

Historian David Hein and business leader William Bachmann shared their perspectives on the enduring impact of Marshall's vision and leadership. Board Chairman Stephen Chapin concluded with remarks detailing the future of the Marshall Center.

Local dignitaries Mayor Kelly Burk and Council Members Zach Cummings and Neil Steinberg celebrated with us. Thank you to everyone who joined us for this celebration! **★**


